March Outing to the Deschutes

Pine Tree to Beavertail

Our March outing is on March 23 on the Deschutes River. We will float between Pine Tree and Beavertail, launching at Pine Tree at about 9:00. Also, there is much bank access for those who do not have a boat or pontoon boat. We will shuttle ourselves.

We will camp at Beavertail Campgound, located about 15 miles downstream of Maupin. To get there, take I-5 and I-84 to The Dalles, travel South on US197 to Tygh Valley, go East on OR 216, and turn left onto the river access road on the East side of the river. Beavertail

campground is about 9 miles downstream. Although I have made this trip in one day, it is much easier to camp at least one night.

Most fishing will be nymphing with a large fly, such as a stone-fly nymph or Prince Nymph, in front with a small trailing fly, such as a size 16-18 gray or peacock soft hackle, size 14-16 Green Rockworm, size 16-20 Hares Ear or Pheasant Tail, size 18 midge pupae, etc. We may have hatches of Blue Wing Olive, size 16-18 Adams, or Black Caddis, size 16-18 black Elk Hair Caddis, in the afternoon. Since



steelhead are present, a 5 or 6weight rod is recommended.

We will grill some hamburgers on Saturday evening, so bring a small side dish to share if you wish.

Remember to purchase your Boater's Pass if you float the river. We have a link on our website.


Our routing took us through San Antonio where we enjoyed a relaxing stay at Lackland Air Force Base, and did the usual touristy stuff. We picked a good time to be here, as the Guadalupe River chapter of Trout Unlimited was hosting a "Troutfest" at New Braunfels iust to the north of us. Although touted to be a really big thing for the locals who might be enamored with all things fly fishing, it was anything but. (Sometimes, they just don't do everything bigger in Texas).

What they lacked in size however, was made up for with enthusiasm, and to their credit, their keynote speaker and presenter was none other than Mr. Lefty Kreh. Mr. Kreh is indeed a master of the long rod, and has forgotten more about using one than most of us will ever hope to learn. It was indeed an honor and privilege to be able to attend one of his classes; especially knowing that at 88 years of age, it could well be one of his last public appearances.

The Guadalupe River is Texas' premiere trout stream and a world class fishery. The river itself resembles the South Umpgua and is a tail out stream from the dam that created Canyon Lake, which is located just north of New Braunfels. The water that feeds the river comes directly from the bottom of the lake, and provides for some true trophy trout fishing. As might be expected, Catch and Release is a way of life. You are allowed to keep one Rainbow or Brown trout per day, BUT—it must be in excess of 18 inches. AND, there is no public access. All of the river banks are private property, and owed by a number of camping resorts, where river access is given to those who are staying there. Some will allow access to <u>their</u> river frontage for a pay to play rod fee.

Needless to say, I did not spend my pennies to fish for something I can do at home for nothing. Cheapo? Yes! But I am saving them for my salt water adventures along the Texas Gulf Coast in search of Red Fish, Sea Trout, or maybe a Tarpon (Yea Right!). And then of course, there is Belize, where I can hear Bonefish, Snook, and Permit calling my name, and where our cruise ship will be stopping for a day. That one might just break the great grandkids piggy banks; as the going rate for a guide and boat runs \$450. But then, grandpa is worth it. Right kids? RIGHT KIDS??

February Outing to the Crooked River

It seems like the words "hardy" and "intrepid" often characterize the Santiam Flycasters who attend the club outings. The February trip to the Crooked River in Central Oregon provided an opportunity for adventure for those "hardy and intrepid" folk who made their way to spend some time on this river.

The three who spent Friday night in tents at Devil's Post Pile Campground, (Ken, Tim, and Loren) showed great dedication to our sport. The temperature dropped to 21 degrees and a gusty wind came up that blew away the Club's dining canopy. Fortunately, the tents did not follow. The next morning they woke up to a dusting of snow, and, as Tim writes, "the remnants of our Camp." After they made a fire, had some coffee and breakfast, they went upstream to fish Big Bend Campground just below Bowman Dam. Some hatches were coming off and it was fun to watch the trout break the surface with their noses or rolling like porpoises. The Crooked River is a beautiful setting. Tim reports seeing and/or hearing some interesting birds: the Northern Pygmy Owl,

Golden Eagles, and Great Horned Owls calling to each other.

We were all glad to see Sam when he arrived with the hamburgers and grill. It was kind of a windy lunch but it sure hit the spot.

A couple more arrived after lunch bringing the number of our group to nine. Sam, Matt, and his Dad fished Saturday afternoon and reported catching some fish as well. That showed a good amount of diligence on their part due to the cold, windy weather.

All in all the Crooked River outing provided a memorable experience and some good memories as we look forward to what we hope will be warmer outings in the next few months.

March Fly of the Month— Caddis Pupae By Jim Ferguson



After living as a larva, the caddis transitions into the pupa stage where it builds some protective cavity and closes it off as it makes the transformation to the adult. This process takes about one to several weeks to complete. During this phase, all adult parts are formed and completed before emergence. When it is time for emergence, the pupa cuts itself out of its chamber, swims and floats to the surface. They eventually break thru the surface tension and escape as an adult.

The following recipe is a realistic / exact pattern for an emerging caddis.

TMC 205, TMC 205BL, size 12 - 16 Hook: Thread: Olive (or to match body color) Shuck (optional): Antron sparkle emerger yarn

Abdomen: V-rib clear, or colored to match naturals, 2 nine inch sections to be woven. Un-

derbody of floss, crystal flash / splash or dubbing to match naturals

Emu, olive or natural Legs: Wings: Medallion sheeting

Olive or orange dyed mallard fiber swept back Antennae: Eyes: Mono eyes made from 30# maxima

Thorax: Insect Green dubbing or Ice Dub Caddis Green

ORDER OF TYING

- Mount hook in vise, attach thread about I eye length back of hook eye.
- Lay a short thread base about 1/16" long and mount the eyes on top of the shank using figure eight wraps.
- Take the thread back to middle of hook (If you want a trailing shuck, take the thread back a ways and attach the shuck material and bind it down as you take the thread to the back of the hook. You want to get it to look like the grub shape, then take the thread to the middle of the hook.)
- Attach V-rib on the top edges of the shank. (2 nine inch sections, can be shorter, but wait until you learn how to do the weaving.) Tie the V-rib down on the shank and take the thread and the V-rib to the back of the hook. You want to get pretty far down the shank to give this pattern a grub like
- Add some dubbing to the thread, or tie in the underbody material and wrap thread and body material forward to the thorax position.
- Weave the body to the thorax position and tie off. Cut off waste.
- 7. Attach legs on lower sides of body.
- Cut the medallion sheeting for the wings
- Attach medallion sheeting so it hangs along sides.
- 10. Tie in the antennae to sweep back over the body, slightly v shape.
- 11. Dub the thorax. Be sure to wrap over the eyes and make a figure 8 of dubbing around the eyes. Tie off and trim waste, then pick out the dubbing.
- 12. Construct the head, whip finish, cut off thread waste. Place head cement over thread head.

If you do not know how to weave the body described above, you can simply use one strand of V-rib, or D-rib, or round vinyl body material and tie it down the shank as described above and then simply wrap the body material forward over the underbody material. Not quite as natural appearing as the woven body but still effective. Jim Schollmeyer's book, **Benchside Reference**, gives some directions .
