Jim Wigington: What Makes Trout Streams and Steelhead Rivers Tick? May 9 —7:00 pm

Jim Wigington is a FFF certified fly casting instructor with over 35 years of fly fishing experience ranging from the mountains of Virginia to the Rocky Mountains to the Pacific Northwest and Alaska. Jim also has over 30 years of experience leading watershed research projects as a faculty member at Oklahoma State University and as a research hydrologist with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

During this talk, Jim will provide a bird's eye view of the ways in which climate, terrain and geology shape trout streams and steelhead rivers across Oregon. Jim will explain why some streams offer much better fishing than others.

If you have ever wondered why the John Day River is an excellent steelhead river but not a trout stream while the Deschutes River is excellent both as a steelhead river and trout stream; Jim's talk will help answer some of those nagging questions.

BUGOLOGY 101 RETURNS with John Rodriguez.

John's presentation will feature hatches and angling possibilities in the Willamette Valley, Central Oregon, and the opening High Lakes.

Special attention is given to the Green Drake Hatch on the Metolius and the big Golden Stone and Salmon Fly stoneflies

Casting and Fly Tying at 6:15

Presenting your fly with confidence is an important skill to develop. May's meeting offers you an opportunity to brush up on your casting skills. The lawn will open at 6:15 pm to practice with the help of several Certified Fly Casting Instructors.

Bring your fly rod to the meeting.

Also there will be Fly Tyers demonstrating their favorite summer flies.

Come early and join in the fun before the general meeting.

May Outing to Davis Lake—June to the Metolius River

Technically, we will have two outings in May, May 4 at Davis Lake and June 1 on the Metolius River.

To get to Davis Lake, drive South on I-5, turn onto Highway 58 South of Eugene, turn left onto the Crescent cutoff East of Willamette Pass, turn left onto the Cascades Lake Highway and drive about 8 miles North to

the Lavaflow Campground (on the Northeast corner of Lava Lake), where we will camp. The campground does not have a water supply.

Our Davis Lake outing is an informal outing, so we will not provide a meal. Bring enough food or keep one or two of the Largemouth Bass we hope to catch and eat that for dinner!

A floating device is highly recommended. Because the fish may be large, use a 5 to 8-weight rod, probably with sinking line. Use bunny leeches, woolly buggers, etc. for the bass and your choice of flies for the large trout in the lake.

For the Metolius outing on June 1, we will camp at Smiling River

From the President By Ken Karnosh

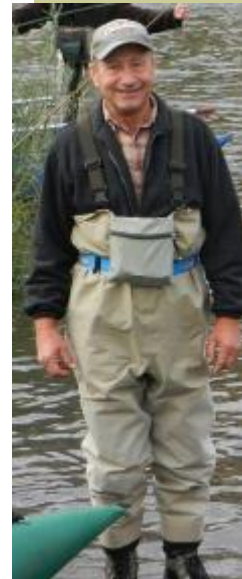

This is an opportunity to part with some of your excess, seldom used equipment as well as an opportunity to get some equipment at a good price. That is a win for both parties!

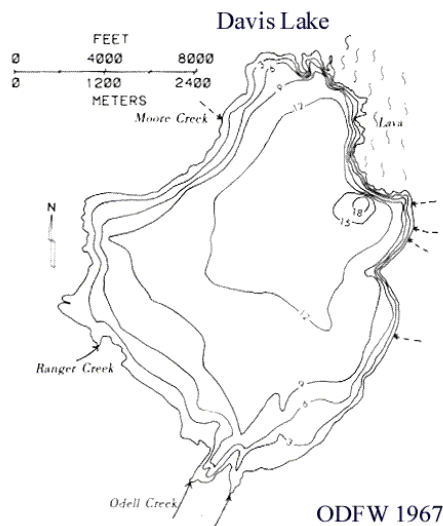
Name Tags

May Fly of the Month— Stalcup's Green Drake Emerger

The *Stalcup's Green Drake Emerger* is a great, realistic Green Drake Emerger (Cripple) Fly Pattern. The *Stalcup's Green Drake Emerger* is great on western spring creeks and slick water dry fly conditions. Picky Trout often focus and target on crippled or emerging mayflies. This is the most vulnerable stage of a mayfly, and wary trout know this! The *Stalcup's Green Drake Emerger* is the perfect fly to fool these difficult fish

Thread: Cream UTC 70

Tail: Cream Antron Yarn

Body: PMD Superfine Dubbing

Head: Golden Olive Superfine Dubbing

Wing1: Natural Dun CDC Oiler Puff

Wing2: Clear Medallion Sheeting

Legs: Partridge
